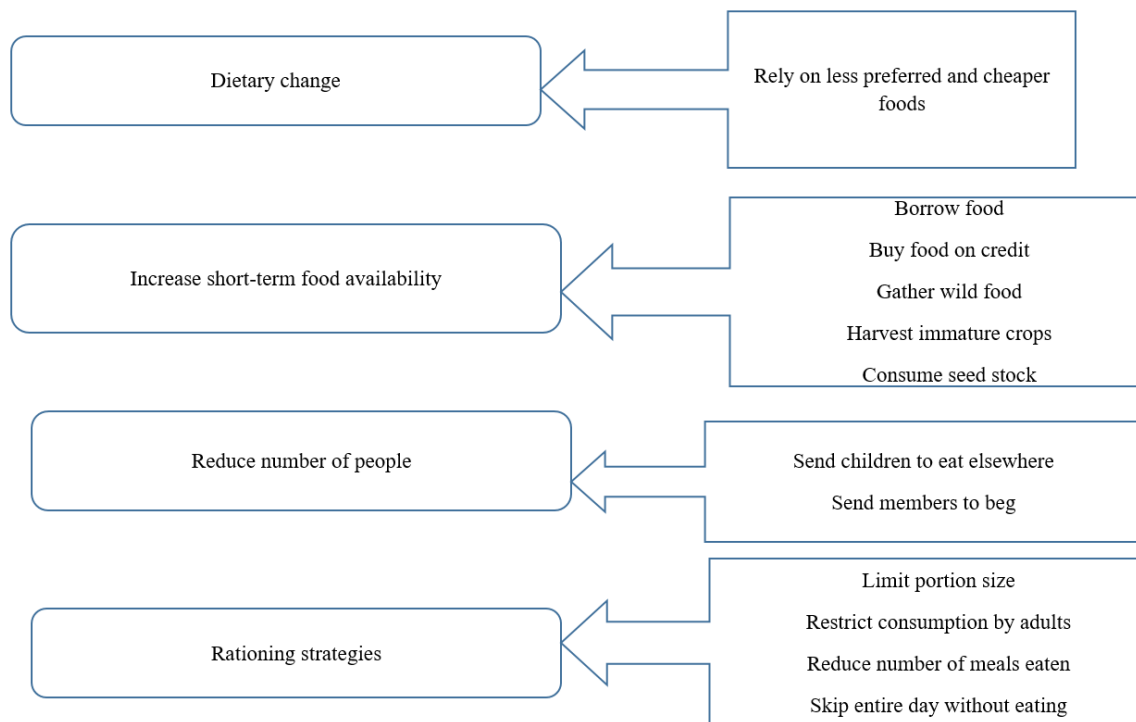


Fig. S1 Construction of coping strategy index.

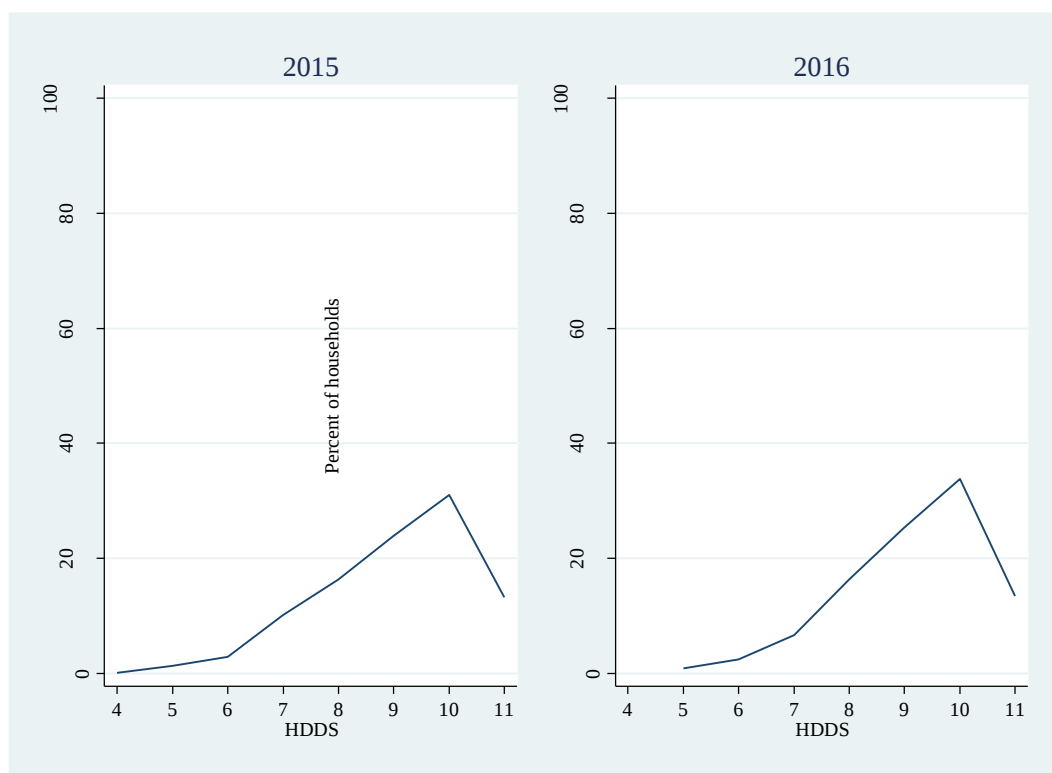


Fig. S2 Distribution of household dietary diversity score (HORTINLEA 2015 and 2016).
